1 Please Don't Tell

PDT bar is also known as the [Please Don't Tell bar](#). This is a Speakeasy-style cocktail bar. It's located in the East Village of Manhattan, New York City. Dial the correct number, and the phone booth wall slides open to reveal an intimate speakeasy. It's known for creating cocktails and cozy atmospheres. PDT is a must-visit for those seeking exclusivity. The speakeasy is located in a hidden space alongside the hot dog shop Crif Dog. Inside the bar is a small space, for no more than a dozen people the space has bar tools as well as a few books and tables. The bar menu includes craft cocktails and snacks, including gourmet hot dogs, tater tots, and french fries.

2. Attaboy

A nondescript gray door on the lower east side marks the entrance to [Attaboy](#). A bar that takes mixology to and art from. this is a Craft cocktail bar in the Lower east side on the new york city. The bar has had an outside influence on the bar industry globally, and regionally in NYC. The bar does not have a sign outside, or menus inside. The bartenders craft personalized cocktails based on your preference, ensuring a one-of-a-kind experience every time.

The bar first opened in 2012 and was the first location of Mil & Honey a pioneering speakeasy that moved the flatiron District that year. the bar owner and bartenders have created embryos of modern classics at he bat including Sam Ross with the penicillin and paper plane.

3. The Back Room

If you are looking for one of the best cocktail bars in New York City that is The back room. Step back in time to the Prohibition era at The Back Room, one of the city's few authentic speakeasies, hidden behind a tiy shop facade, this bar serves drinks in teacups to replicate the

converted drinking practice of the 1920s. that business was Ratner's restaurant another Lower East Side institutions that opened up in 1908 and moved to Delancy Street just before the Volstead Act took effect. The kosher restaurant was seen as a culinary compliment to neither neighbor icon. Katz's Deli. but its back room served illegal alcohol and the criminal underworld too.

The bar is meany to be as historically accurate as possible. But Baronius pointed out that a lot of 1920s speakeasies were holes in the wall because of the constant threat of voice turning them over.

4. Bathtub Gin

Behind the seemingly ordinary coffee shop in Chelsea hides Bathtub Gin. it's a stylish speakeasy bar inspired by the prohibition era discover a speakeasy-inspired atmosphere with decor, where dim lighting and the gentle hum of live jazz create a charming ambiance. Before you go there you have to take Reservevishiona when they open for the evening. After you enter the bar you will understand that it's true to their name, they have a bathtub. Yes, ' a real bathtub. You can take all sorts of fun pictures with, in, or around this beautiful clawfoot bathtub.

The bar's dedication to crafting exceptional gin-based cocktails, like the bathtub gin-martini with house-infused botanicals, ensures an unforgettable experience for gin and cocktails lovers alike. So, you can start your evening with giggle juice (19\$), mystery cocktails with egg white (20\$), Porter's tropical Old Tom gin (16\$), and Bombay Premier Cru Gin & Matcha (16\$). Giggle Juice is made with Yellow Chartreuse, Rocky's Liqueur, Falernum, Pineapple, and Pineau des Charrettes. Their service too friendly, and efficient and they always take good care of every customer. And sometimes, they give discounts occasionally, like someone's birthday. And any other occupations

5. Angel's Share

Angel Share is a speakeasy-style bar in the East Village of Manhattan, New York City. It's a Japanese-style bar. Tucked inside a Japanese restaurant in the East Village, Angel's Share is a serene oasis away from the city's chaos. This bar is also known for its elegant atmosphere and expertly crafted cocktails. This bar has been a local favor for years. The unscaled craft cocktails bar had a romantic room and a view of Stuyvesant triangles. It opened in 1993. The bar utilized elements of Japanese bartending. Including measuring stirring, and shaking drinks with precision: something still practiced in Japan while the U.S. was in a "dark age" in the bar industry

The bar became immensely popular around 2015 with long lines and waits of up to an hour, taking away from its element of secrecy. The bar's owner decided to another speakeasy sometimes referred to as an annex of Angels Share, a bove Sharaku, a restaurant owned by Yoshida.

6. La Esquina's basement Bar

[La Esquina](#) is Famous for its street-level taqueria, but the real magic happened underground. To access this hidden bar it has a door and descending narrow staircase, the basement bar offers a sultry video and impressive tequila selections. Esquina Comun was founded by Mexican Chef Dolores Gonzalez and her Spanis partner, Carlos Perez in 2021. After being reviewed by *The New York Times*, the restaurant became popular.

Colonia Condesa, Cuauhtémoc, Mexico City locate this restaurant. this restaurant's seating capacity has spaces for 30 people, and dinners are required to make reservations via Instagram. after the reservations are confirmed they will be informed of the location formally.

7. Little Branch

The unmarked doof in the west village to a subterranean bar know known for its jazz-age ambiance and expertly made cocktails. 10. Clover Club

While not hidden in the traditional sense, Clover Club in Brooklyn's Cobble Hill is a lesser-known gem among Manhattanites. The Clover Club was chartered in 1882. Of the cocktails, Roberts Hess claims it has a long history and was enjoyed by the captains of the industry who were members of the famous club. And published recipes for the cocktails, nearly identical to the modern, Clover Club cocktails. Appears as early as 1908. Its vintage decor, cozy booths, and extensive cocktail menu make it worth crossing the bridge.
